WINTER FUN

BE AN OTTER

Did you know that river otters sometimes slide on their bellies across the snow? These paths are called otter slides. Otter slides made in winter snow are typically 12 or more inches wide, and as long as 25 feet. You too can be an otter in winter with these simple steps:

- Make sure you're dressed warmly, with a smooth, water-resistant layer over your middle.
- Find a short hill (not too steep) with good, slick snow, and not too many trees, bushes or rocks in the way.
- Push yourself down the slope—head first! The first trip may be a little slow (even otters have to push themselves along), but you should get faster and faster as the track gets set.
- step 4 Repeat and repeat. Feel the otter joy!

WINTER WRAP-UP

The animals in your neighborhood have all sorts of adaptations that help them survive even the coldest winter. But that doesn't mean we can't do our part to help them out. Try a few of these ideas to help local birds, mammals, and other creatures weather the winter:

- Let your yard be a little bit wild. If you leave plant stems, stacks of wood, rock piles, and layers of leaves in and around your yard and garden, you'll be giving small animals some good places to tuck away for the cold season.
- Set out a bird feeder. Bird feeders can really help birds stay nourished when food is scarce. Try checking with your local Audubon Society to find out what kind of food you should leave out.
- Drive with care. Snowfall makes streets narrow. And some animals are attracted to the salt used to help melt snow and ice. Make sure your parents drive carefully to keep animals safe.
